THE ECOLOGICAL GARDENER TRAINING PROGRAM

at the Horn Farm Center teaches the skills for designing, building, and stewarding biodiverse native habitats that support the interconnected health of wildlife and humans.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

From your own backyard to forest next door, the Ecological Gardener Training Program (EGTP) is your window into the world of **designing and nurturing native plant communities** that support wildlife, pollinators, and ecological resilience in human-managed and human-impacted spaces.

As an exploratory study, the EGTP cultivates deep familiarity and connection with native plant communities across a range of environments. Students develop essential knowledge of local ecology that can be applied in a variety of contexts, from lawn conversion to support native habitat at home or the workplace to pursuing a full-fledged career as an ecological landscape practitioner.





Who Takes the EGTP?

- Homeowners exploring lawn conversion.
- Employees and volunteers eager to bring nature to the workplace or community space.
- Career beginners, pivoters, and gap year students looking to explore or enter the native landscaping workforce.
- Parents, environmental educators, and non-traditional students seeking native plant knowledge to share with others.

🖇 Ecological Core Classroom Curriculum >>>>

Sundays, 2/11-3/3, 8am-4pm

Held in conjunction with the <u>Land Steward Training Program</u>, this blended curriculum covers essential ecological foundations for regenerative land practices. Students are given the opportunity to explore new lenses for seeing and interacting with natural systems.

Topics:

- Earth's natural history.
- Basic ecology and natural cycles.
- Historical land uses and misuses.
- Frameworks for ecological stewardship.
- Field and forest movement mechanics.

- Gain knowledge in ecological systems and plant identification.
- Enhance observation skills for native plants communities and landscape archetypes.
- Practice foundational field skills in gardening for ecology and wildlife.
- Experience hands-on, professional project design and implementation in a collaborative setting.
- Take home a toolkit outfitted for ecological observation and gardening, including a Hori Hori knife and loupe.

- Optional shared lunch with LSTP trainees.



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

APPLICATION AND FEES

To Apply:

Head to <u>https://hornfarmcenter.org/ecological-gardening-training/</u> and submit an application. After applying, you will receive an email from the instructors to schedule an **informal get-to-know-you meeting** to discuss your interests, goals, and needs.

Program Cost: \$1200

\$75/week for 16 weeks covering instructor hours, field trip reservations, plants, and program supplies.

Experiential add-ons:

The Land Steward Training Program runs concurrently with the EGTP, taking place Tuesdays 3/5 to 5/21 from 8am to 4pm. **Get a taste of the LSTP by joining select afternoon sessions (1pm-4pm)** for an added cost. These workday-style windows cover hands-on, rigorous experience in bolstering natural landscapes by addressing soil stability, water retention, and other land-based factors that are critical companions to the wellbeing of native plants. **Dates and prices for LSTP add-on sessions will be announced at a later time!**
